Value	The core value of this half term is: Kindness. This half term, we will be focusing on the core value of <b>Kindness</b> . Children will explore what it means to be kind in different contexts, both in the classroom and beyond. Through class discussions and activities, we will reflect on how kindness helps to build a positive and supportive learning environment. Children will be encouraged to demonstrate kindness to their peers and staff, and we will celebrate acts of kindness throughout the term.	
English	Reading: We will continue using the Read Write Inc. Programme, which is a structured and systematic approach to teaching phonics. Reception children will begin learning to recognise and blend sounds, while Year 1 and Year 2 will consolidate their phonics knowledge, building fluency and confidence in reading. Throughout the term, children will engage in guided reading sessions where they will discuss texts, explore vocabulary, and develop comprehension skills. To complement their phonics work, we will explore a variety of engaging stories and non-fiction texts to inspire a love of reading.	

One key text we will focus on is Troll Swap by Leigh Hodgkinson, a charming story that will captivate the children's imaginations while supporting the development of their reading skills.
